December Field Trip Saturday 12th - 9:00 am

December field trip to Wilson Quarry

So this year since we will not be able to get together for our annual holiday pot luck and white mammoth gift exchange* we are doing a rare December field trip. The site will be the Wilson Clay Pit just north of Brownwood, Texas. This is a Late Pennsylvanian Period site well known for ancient shark teeth and crinoids.

This will be a single site trip but it will easily keep you busy all day. We are also pushing the meeting time back to 9AM to make for an easier drive up.

Directions from Austin:

Take 183 north all the way to Early, Texas (right next to Brownwood). The meeting site is at the Heartland Mall in Early at 9:00AM Saturday morning. Early (essentially part of Brownwood) is north of Austin on Highway 183 about 2 ½ hours from central Austin. As you approach Brownwood, 183 makes a left turn at a light. The mall will be about a mile ahead on your right. Look for a group of cars in the parking lot. Please be on time as we have about a 30 minute drive from there to get to the site. Note that cellphone reception up that way can be spotty so be on time.

We will looking for upper Pennsylvanian marine fossils. Crinoid material abounds here, as well as brachiopods, bryozoans, sponges, clams, gastropods and the rare Paleozoic shark tooth. Trilobites have been found also but are very rare here. Most material will be small to hand size but there are larger blocks with nice things in them. And some in large boulders with things you might want to remove. Bring containers of various sizes, hammer and chisels, eye protection and something to wrap fragile things in. Bring bags for the larger items. Bring lots of water, sturdy footwear, food for lunch or snacks, and watch the weather for Brownwood for appropriate clothing. It can be colder there than here. It is a long way back to town and there are no facilities, so be prepared. Given the quantity and quality of fossils, it's always a good trip to Wilson Quarry.

November Field Trip Report

Mother Neff site & Environs

On a fine fall day we met by the gas station in Moody Texas. Eric and Jessica Jones and their daughter Lilly, Rose, Yoli and William Lins, Robert and Diane Vlasik Fredrick and Melinda Faulk, Gary Vliet, GradyParks, Allen Keith, Lori Magennus, Paul Hammerschmidt, Leslie Riddel, Brian and Max, Ron DiPronio, Nadia Dapp, Becky, Vaughn Nelson, John Hinte and co-trip leader Jamie Shelton. We all caravanned from Moody several miles to the first collecting site. I do apologize for stopping too soon at the wrong spot for the first time we stopped. It has been several years since I have been here, but we did arrive at the proper site and guickly spread out upon the hillside.

Lilly Jones found a beautiful *Goniopygus* echinoid in good shape. One of the nicer finds, kudos to Lilly. Leslie Ridell found a nice fully crystallized gastropod, a Turitella. Nadia found a *Heteraster* that was partially crystallized and Jamie found a Nice ammonite *Oxytropidoceras*. Also Jamie said Paul found a very interesting smooth ammonite that did not look like a egonoceras? Everyone came away with something.

A couple came up that lived nearby and asked what we were collecting. I explained how this part of Texas was shallow ocean during the Cretaceous period and we were collecting fossils from that time period. Jamie showed them

her ammonite and they decided to collect also with their young son. Next new caravan of cars showed up that turned out to be a field trip from Baylor university. I chatted with the leader for awhile and Jamie suggested we collect a few minutes more and go to the other site.

Jamie led us to the other site past Gatesville several miles. The new site that Jamie took us to was real interesting. Two neat hills out in the beautiful Texas country side, Comanche peak formation. We quickly spread out and started to find fossils. I found a nice bivalve Modiolus clam right away of a species I don't believe I have collected before. Fredrick Faulk found a nice steinkern clam mold that had the muscle attachments with a lot of detail. Everyone had a good time and it was nice day to collect.
